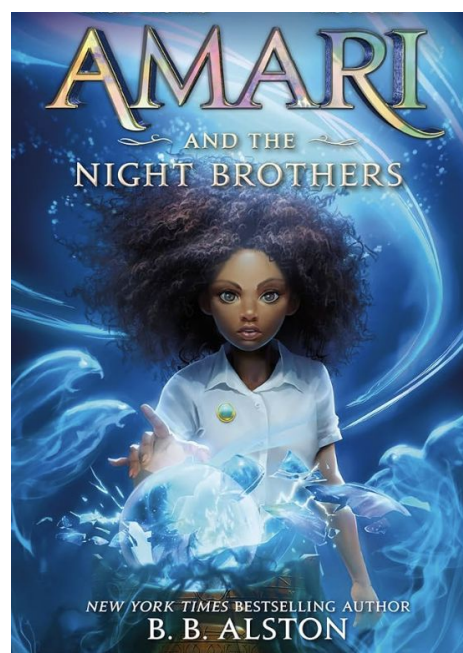

### 1. Minnetonka Cave Monument

One of the coolest places near Cokeville. This massive limestone cave has underground rooms filled with stalactites, stalagmites, and winding stairways. The cave stays around 40°F year-round, making it perfect during hot summer weather.

### 2. Fossil Butte National Monument

I enjoy watching them grow both on and off the track.

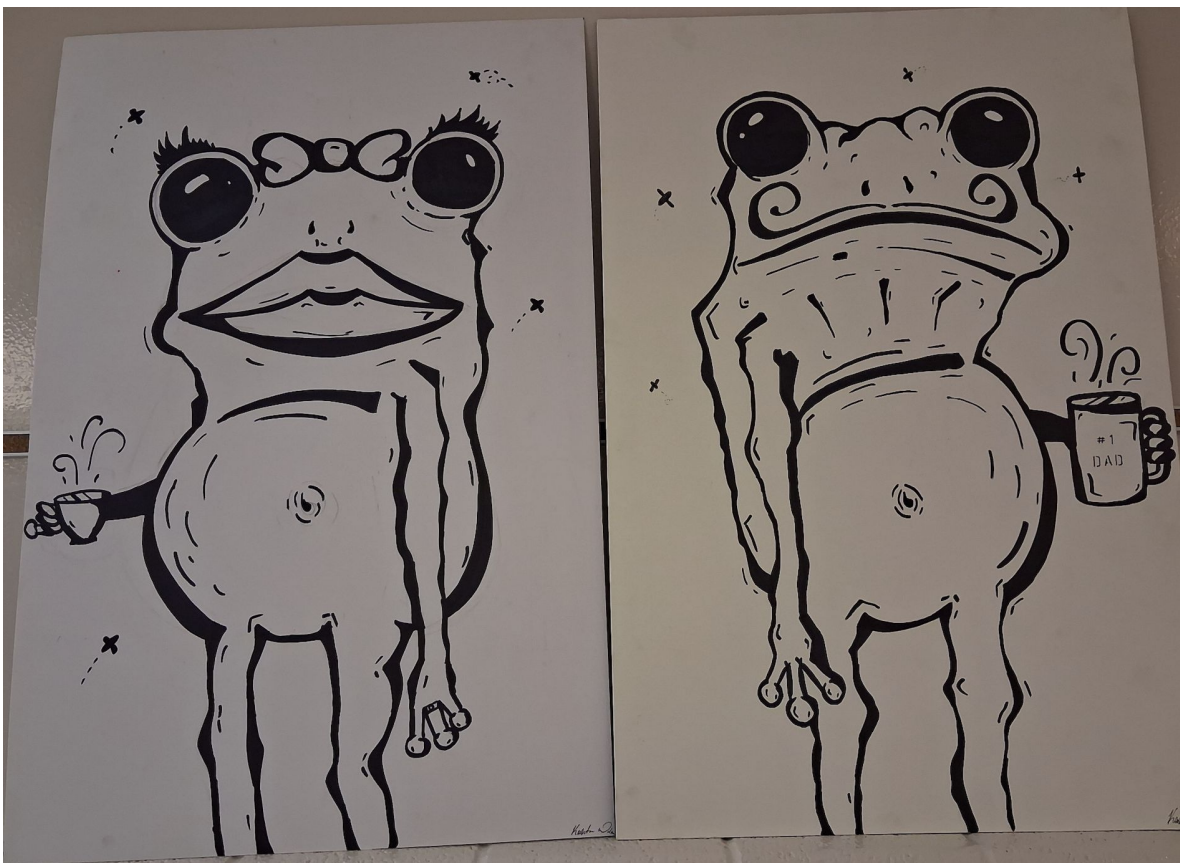
**What goals do you have for your team this season?**
